

In That Day!

Since 1997, God's Church has been given clear understanding on the meaning of the biblical phrase "in that day". God has shown that this phrase is referring to 'the Day of the Lord'. This day will begin in this end time the moment Christ comes to His temple 'as a thief in the night' *just before* the commencement of the tribulation but extends beyond the return of Christ (2 Pet. 3:10). Let us take a look at just three scriptures to clearly demonstrate this Biblical fact:

- "And they shall be mine, saith the Lord of hosts, ***in that day*** when I make up my jewels; and I will spare them, as a man spareth his own son that serveth him" (Mal. 3:17) In this scripture, the phrase "in that day" refers to the ***end-time*** when Christ comes to his temple marking the beginning of the Day of the Lord to 'take' His jewels to a Place of Safety (Matt. 24:40-41). This takes place just *prior to the Great Tribulation*.
- "And it shall come to pass ***in that day***, saith the Lord God, that I will cause the sun to go down at noon, and I will darken the earth in the clear day: And I will turn your feasts into mourning, and all your songs into lamentation; and I will bring up sackcloth upon all loins, and baldness upon every head; and I will make it as the mourning of an only son, and the end thereof as a bitter day" (Amos 8:9-10). As can be understood from this scripture, "in that day" refers to a time *during the Great Tribulation*.
- "And it shall come to pass ***in that day***, that the mountains shall drop down new wine, and the hills shall flow with milk and all the rivers of Judah shall flow with waters, and a fountain shall come forth of the house of the Lord, and shall water the valley of Shittim" (Joel 3:18). The phrase "in that day" is here clearly referring to the time *after the Great Tribulation* and during ***the millennium*** after Christ returns!

This undeniable biblical proof demonstrates that the phrase "in that day" refers to a time period which begins the moment Christ comes 'as a thief in the night' and extends well beyond Christ's second coming. Understanding this phrase opens up a number of Biblical prophecies which have not been understood till recently!
